ROOM WITH A MENU: After a decadent multicourse meal lasting several hours, there's nothing much left to do except loosen your belt and doze off into a contented slumber. That's easy to do at ABaC, a much-raved-about contemporary restaurant in Barcelona headed by provocative Catalan chef Xavier Pellicer. Last year, ABaC relocated to a grand villa on Avenida Tibidabo, a famed scenic road that winds above the city. The structure includes 15 modern bedrooms and a terrace overlooking



the gardens that surround the property. The interior is as futuristic as Pellicer's cuisine. Each suite is unique, but all are spacious and stylishly outfitted with warm lighting and minimalist furniture in white and beige. Guests wake to stunning views of the city, and a substantial breakfast. And they may see a lot of the chef — to reach the restaurant, hotel guests pass through the kitchen. abacbarcelona.com

(ART ON THE ROAD) COVER Story

OFTEN CALLED THE "Dickens of the paintbrush," Norman Rockwell was one of the most prolific artists of the 20th century. Over a lengthy career he created nearly 3,000 paintings, each telling a story of everyday life.

Starting in his teens as an art director for Boys' Life magazine, Rockwell quickly made his name as an illustrator. In 1916 he did his first cover for the Saturday Evening Post, beginning a 47-year relationship with the widely read publication that resulted in over 300 covers. Likely his most recognizable works, the Post covers portray all aspects of the American dream — families, presidents, soldiers, and, on occasion, even the artist himself. Through these works Rockwell became a household name, appreciated for his ability to connect with ordinary people and

evoke a range of sentiments.



Now, for the first time ever, a careerspanning exhibit of his work is traveling across the United States. American Chronicles: The Art of Norman Rockwell embarked on a nine-city tour last year, and it's currently at the Detroit Institute of Arts. The exhibit features highlights from Rockwell's entire career, including 41 oil paintings, every one of his Saturday Evening Post covers, and a selection of drawings and posters. Among the works are his famous Triple Self-Portrait and the Four Freedoms series, which was used by the government to help sell war bonds during World War II. American Chronicles is at the Detroit Institute of Arts through May 31 before moving on to the Museum of Art in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. nrm.org
